

Vicar's Letter



Ascension Day and Pentecost have come and gone and there are no great church festivals in the near future on which to focus. Due to lockdown, it is difficult to find anything to focus on or look forward to which is what we would normally be doing to give our lives a structure. Within church, we would

be planning social and fund-raising events, looking forward to the Teddy Bear's Picnic and Messy Church. At home we'd be planning family visits, possibly anticipating a holiday, planning a special birthday celebration, but we can't do any of these because we don't know when we'll be free to participate in them. It's only in these strange times that we perhaps realise how much of our time is usually spent in looking forward and planning for the future. And so we have to engage with the here and now and appreciate what is right in front of us. As we read in Matthew chapter 6, 34 "So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today." Yes, today is all we need to concentrate on, even though that might be easier said than done.

I have been trying to hold on to these words for myself because this is a doubly strange time for me, as I am now in my last month before retirement. Plans for moving and what next have all been put on hold due to the turmoil coronavirus has thrown us into. 'We'll have to wait and see', is heard time and again in the vicarage as plans are made and then discarded. Cupboards are sorted, papers shredded, but waiting to see is still where we're at. There are only two definites at the moment. One is that I will retire on 30th June; however, I will not have said goodbye and will still be in the house until – well, who knows, we'll have to wait and see!

I have decided that instead of concerning myself about what's happening, or not happening, I am going to identify a new blessing for each day of my countdown to retirement. Thirty things for which I am particularly grateful, and then we'll have to wait and see what next.



To YOU the Congregation - A FINANCIAL MESSAGE

As I'm sure you would expect, Covid-19 has had a significant impact on the parish finances. This is mainly due to cancelled public worship services – and therefore no collections of envelopes or cash and cancelled fundraising and social events. Even if envelopes can be dropped off or collected soon, if no further fundraising is possible this year, it is predicted we will have a £10,000 deficit by the end of the year. However you give, we are asking everyone to think and pray whether you are in a position to financially contribute additional funds to the parish during the Covid-19 restrictions.

If you give by envelope, please consider:

- Increasing your regular giving permanently or during the next few months through online banking, by telephone banking or, if safe to do so, in branch
- Make a one-off payment to help us make back the money we have lost with no fundraisers and social events

Thanks to the Diocese of York on my Departure

As I watch the strangely quiet River Ouse from our apartment at Bishopthorpe Palace, my mind is taken back to a day in 2005 when the river was far from quiet! Many of you will remember my arrival by boat at York Minster on the day I began my ministry as Archbishop here, a day full of life, noise, celebration and excitement. A bitterly cold day, I decided not to release the seven doves of peace – they could not get to Wigan safely.

There is much talk of change at the moment. What has happened in the last few months is, as has been said so often, unprecedented, and what will happen over the coming months still uncertain. In the midst of these unwelcome and sudden changes, may I encourage you to reflect on a different kind of change – the gentle, constant and yet life-transforming change brought about by God's Spirit working through his church to bring love, joy, peace, power and salvation to us and to all who will receive God's generous gifts.

In nearly fifteen years as Archbishop of York, I am humbled and filled with thankfulness when I consider the changes God has brought about in me and in this Diocese. Through God's generosity and through yours, through God's limitless hospitality and through ours, and most of all through God's strong and saving love poured into our hearts and shaping us together into the likeness of Christ, I have been blessed and privileged to see our generous churches making and nurturing disciples, our relationships, our prayer and our witness transformed, becoming more and more a reflection of our calling to be the embassy of heaven on earth. There are too many highlights to mention them all here – outdoor baptisms outside York Minster, the change to Free Will Offers, my Pilgrimage of Prayer, Witness and Blessing, the Deanery Missions, Come and See... the list would never end! Friends, thank you for allowing me to become part of you – loving each other into holiness, bearing each other's burdens, and of course becoming Yorkshireman of the Year in 2007!

It is in many ways hard to leave now, when we are all in such need of leadership and of care. But I leave without fear, for the Lord our God is with us – God our loving Father, God the Son, Jesus Christ our eternal friend, and God the Holy Spirit, the giver of life. He is the same yesterday, today and for ever, and I am thankful to him for all that he has done in and through me during my time as Archbishop, for all that he is doing in these troubling times, and for all that is yet to be, for myself and for the

Diocese of York. The Best is yet to be.
